**I. Mr. M.Y Tarigami, Hon'ble MLA, to move the following Cut Motions:-**

**1. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in demand No:15 to highlight the issue of non-availability of essential ration items such as sugar, kerosene, and pulses in rural and far-flung areas of J&K, causing hardship to economically weaker sections.**

**Reply:-**

The Department of FCS&CA ensures availability of food-grains viz Rice, Wheat,wheat flour and Sugar under NFSA/NPHH, PMFSS, SAAY and JKSSS across the Jammu &Kashmir. Besides, with regard to distribution of other commodities like pulses, millets, spices and oil seeds through PDS and their procurement through NAFED (National Agriculture Cooperative Marketing Federation of India limited) and FPOs(Food Processing Organizations),it is informed that the proposal is under active consideration in the department. As Jammu and Kashmir has been declared as kerosene Oil free state, as such there is no proposal under consideration for distribution of kerosene oil through PDS in the Department.

**2. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in demand No:15 in order to discuss separately th`e details of location-wise government ration depots and fair price shops functioning in Kulgam constituency as also the proposals pending for sanction of fair price shops (habitation-wise) in uncovered habitations of the constituency and the time by which these FPSs are created to minimize the hardships of the inhabitants in collecting the ration items.**

**Reply:-**

There are 42 Government Sale Centres and 63 Fair Price Shops in Kulgam constituency. Besides, 13 proposed locations are under active consideration in the said constituency for establishment of new Fair price Shops. The location wise details are annexed herewith at **Annexure "A"**. The process of identification of locations for establishment of new FP Shops is currently in the consultation phase with the Hon'ble MLAs.

**3. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in demand No:15 to draw the attention to for issuance and up-dation of ration cards, especially for newly married couples, migrant families, and eligible beneficiaries under NFSA.**

**Reply:-**

Since the number of beneficiaries with ration card targets is being determined and assigned by the Government of India. Beneficiary and families have been identified on the basis of data obtained from Census 2011. Whenever revised targets are communicated by the Government of India as per revised census figures the inclusion of newly identified families, fresh ration cards under the relevant categories shall be issued accordingly.

The up-dation (addition/ deletion) of ration cards is a continuous process and criteria adopted for inclusion of ration cards are on the basis of rule position in light of S.0 389 after proper verification of genuine/deserving beneficiaries. In case of newly married couples, migrant families their names are being transferred from the parental ration cards to the ration card of the spouse after following norms. However, all eligible beneficiaries have been enrolled/ included in the ration card database of the department in light of extant rules.

**4. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in demand No:15 to discuss the in inadequate storage facilities and godown infrastructure leading to damage and wastage of food grains and the steps taken for construction of godowns to prevent wastages.**

**Reply:-**

The department has adequate storage capacity of food stores and there is no wastage of food grains due to storage capacity. However, for augmentation of food grains storage capacity construction of food stores is being taken up every year under Capex Budget. The creation of additional infrastructure helps in storage, reducing distance & ensuing uninterrupted supply of food grains to the beneficiaries

**5. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in demand No:15 to discuss the hardships faced by beneficiaries due to biometric authentication failures in remote and hilly areas with poor internet connectivity and the need to devise concrete policy so that they are not denied the ration benefits.**

**Reply:-**

No, eligible beneficiary is denied the ration benefit due to biometric authentication failures in remote and hilly areas with poor internet connectivity across Jammu & Kashmir as the department is distributing foodgrains through offline/hybrid mode through ePoS devices in the areas with poor/low network connectivity. As such, no eligible beneficiaries is deprived of ration due to network issues and all beneficiaries are getting due quota of ration.

However, the Department has devised a nominee policy vide Govt. Order No. 61 JK (FCS&CA) of 2021 Dated: 04-08-2021 for

ensuring ration to the persons unable to perform biometric authentications due to old age persons/ hard working labourers, differently abled persons, minors, bedridden or other exceptions brought to the notice of the Department through district Administration. Hence, ensuring no eligible beneficiary is deprived of their monthly entitlement.

**II. Mr. Balwant Singh Mankotia, Hon'ble MLA to move the following Cut Motions:-**

**1. I move a cut of Rs. 100/- in demand No. 15 in order to discuss the reasons for the delay in opening of new Fair Price Shops in Jammu & Kashmir, with particular reference to the Chenani Constituency.**

**Reply:-**

Opening of new Fair Price Shops (FPS) shall be considered only after stabilization of all components of the Smart Public Distribution System (Smart PDS) including ration card allocation system and e-KYC related modules. It has been observed that certain operational aspects of the Smart PDS are presently under stabilization.

Accordingly, the proposals for opening of new FPS may be taken up only after complete stabilization of the said system so as to ensure smooth implementation and avoid administrative or technical complications.

Subsequent to such stabilization the Department shall prepare and furnish a list of proposed new FPS strictly in consonance with the provisions of S.O 41. The said list shall also be rationalized in a comprehensive manner, keeping in view population norms, geographical factors, existing FPS coverage and administrative feasibility and in consultation with the political representatives.

The major component/activity(s) shall fully functional under SMART-PDS are Ration Card Management System, Supply Chain Management System, Distribution portal, integration of database with Mera Ration, Mera eKYC, Ayushman Bharat applications, whereas development/roll out of Procurement portal, Annamitra, Anna Sahayta App (Advanced Grievance Redressal System) is under process. Also, the activities like e-KYC Saturation, Rightful Targeting (Removal of Undeserving Beneficiaries), Upgradation of PoS Machines (L0 → L1) are yet to be fully accomplished.

Since elected Government has assumed the office, it has been thought prudent to rope in elected representatives also to firm up requirements of new Fair Price Shops across Jammu and Kashmir, which necessitates relook of the existing framework. Further steps shall be taken after the required amendments are carried out.

However, Out of 142 locations proposed for opening of New FPSs in Udhampur district, 35 number of locations have been earmarked for opening in Chenani Assembly Constituency.

**2. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the overall functioning of the Food, Civil Supplies & Consumer Affairs Department.**

**Reply:-**

The prime objective of the Department of Food, Civil Supplies and Consumer Affairs Kashmir is to ensure the Food Security of every eligible individual. In order to fulfill the purpose the Department is primarily operating over the schemes like Pradhan Mantri Garib Kalyan Anna Yojana (PMGKAY) in terms of National Food Security Act (NFSA), Prime Minister's Food Supplementation Scheme (PMFSS), Jammu and Kashmir Special Sugar Scheme (JKSSS) and Scheme for Antodaya Anna Yojana (SAAY) whereunder the Foodgrains (Fortified Rice, Wheat/ Atta and Sugar) under respective categories i.e. AAY, PHH and NPHH are being provided to the eligible beneficiaries in a transparent matter. With the

advent of technological advancements the department has a robust mechanism for monitoring supply of Foodgrains through Supply Chain Management wherein the monitoring engulfs the procurement from FCI stations, movement to Godowns/ Sale Centres/ Fair Price Shops and its subsequent distribution amongst the beneficiaries through PoS devices through a network of 1758 Govt. Sale Centres and 2004 Fair Price Shops scattered in every nook and corner of the division to ensure door step delivery of foodgrains which is being monitored on AEPDS module on real time basis. Under these schemes, all the eligible households/ beneficiaries are getting benefitted through respective applicable schemes under their respective eligibility categories and approx. 13.23 lac. families comprising upon 54.09 lac beneficiaries are being provided foodgrains at their doorsteps on monthly basis. The Department also procures Foodgrains (Fortified Rice) for other departments like Social Welfare, Education, and Relief Organization for schemes like ICDS, SAG, MDM and Political Migrants of Special Zone Srinagar. Moreover, prestigious programmes like Inter-State and Intra-State (ONORC) Portability of Foodgrains under NFSA eliminates the possibility of deprivation of entitled quota of ration to any individual from any part of the Country or UT.

In addition to this, the Department also procures foodgrains for ICDS and DMRRR.

**3.I move a cut of Rs 100/- in Demand No.15, in order to discuss the reasons for deletion of the names of most deserving families from the AAY (Antyodaya Anna Yojana) category in the Pattangarh & Matloa areas of Chenani Constituency, and to urge the Govt. to reconsider and restore these deserving families in the appropriate category in a time bound manner.**

**Reply:-**

No deserving family has been deleted from the AAY category in Pattangarh & Matloa areas of Chenani Constituency.

Further, the modification of ration cards including deletion of silent/ghost beneficiaries, conversion of ration card categories, alteration or correction of particulars, addition of new members, transfer of ration cards/members, etc is a continuous process under SMART PDS. A special initiative of Department of Food & Public Distribution, Government of India for rightful targeting of food subsidies is undergoing throughout India, this include the use of Aadhar to cross verifying false entries and ensure rightful targeting e.g GST Income tax, deceased, duplicate and silent beneficiaries etc. The same is being carried out across all Tehsils, including the villages of Pattangarh and Matloa, strictly in accordance with the prescribed norms and guidelines in vogue. So that only deserving/rightful beneficiaries are included in the PDS database.

**4. I move a cut of Rs.100/ in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the desirability of addressing the manpower shortage in the Department, especially in the offices of the TSO Chenani and Latti.**

**Reply:-**

In the Kashmir Division, adequate and sufficient staff is presently available at field level and in the offices of the Tehsil Supply Officers (TSOs), Assistant Directorates, and the Directorate, except in the TSO cadre in Districts Kulgam and Kupwara, where certain vacancies exist. The Department has already initiated steps to fill up these vacancies either by convening the Departmental Promotion Committee (DPC) or by placing eligible Storekeepers as In-charge TSOs, as an interim administrative arrangement, to ensure that the functioning of the offices does not suffer.

However, the department is having shortage of staff in Jammu Division and currently the following staff is working in TSO Office Chenani and Latti:-

TSO Office Chenani

1. TSO = 1
2. Salesman=1

TSO Office Latti

1. TSO =1
2. Storekeeper=1

In order to overcome the shortages of staff, all efforts are being made for recruitment/promotion against the available vacancies.

Further, it is submitted that amendments in non gazetted (Subordinate) Service Recruitment rules of FCS&CA-J&K are under consideration at departmental level.

As and when the same are finalized the non gazetted vacant posts of the department under direct quota shall be referred to JKSSB and promotion quota vacancies shall be filled through DPC.

**5. I move a cut of Rs 100/- in Demand No.15, in order to discuss the desirability of separating ration cards of families that have been bifurcated for a long time.**

**Reply:-**

The number of beneficiaries with ration card targets being determined and assigned by the Government of India. Beneficiary and families have been identified on the basis of data obtained from Census 2011. Whenever revised targets are communicated by the Government of India on account of the inclusion of newly identified families, fresh ration cards under the relevant categories shall be issued accordingly.

**III. Mr.Pawan Kumar Gupta, Hon'ble MLA, to move the following Cut Motions:-**

**1. I move a cut of ₹100 in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the total quantum of commodities procured by the Department of CAPD in Jammu and Kashmir, commodity-wise, with costs involved at appropriate destinations, carriage charges, incidentals at the point of distribution, the cost realised from consumers at subsidized rates, and the burden on the state government category-wise as part of this budget.**

The reply is enclosed as "**Annexure-B**".

**2. I move a cut of 100 in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the steps taken by the Government to enlist bonafide residents of the Union Territory, making them eligible for food and civil benefits through the CAPD across all categories of families under relevant provisions.**

**Reply:-**

Registration of new ration cards is an ongoing process, and applications are being received and processed regularly through the online system as well as through offline mode as per the prescribed procedure and timelines.

The Department of FCS&CA in adherence to the guidelines ensures inclusion of families/ beneficiaries under PDS as per the eligibility criteria mentioned in S.O 389 Dated: 16-11-2021

**3. I move a cut of ₹100 in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the category-wise ration card holders in the JK**

**UT district-wise, particularly in Udhampur district, and steps taken to undo regional discrimination in allocation of ration.**

**Reply:-**

**4.I move a cut of 100 in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the expansion of ration outlets according to physical needs on ground, with the number of existing ration outlets and the number contemplated to be further opened across the JK UT district-wise.**

**Reply:-**

Opening of new Fair Price Shops (FPS) shall be considered only after stabilization of all components of the Smart Public Distribution System (Smart PDS) including ration card allocation system and e-KYC related modules. It has been observed that certain operational aspects of the Smart PDS are presently under stabilization.

Accordingly, the proposals for opening of new FPS may be taken up only after complete stabilization of the said system so as to ensure smooth implementation and avoid administrative or technical complication.

Subsequent to such stabilization the Department shall prepare and furnish a list of proposed new FPS strictly in consonance with the provisions of S.O 41. The said list shall also be rationalized in a comprehensive manner, keeping in view population norms, geographical factors, existing FPS coverage and administrative feasibility and in consultation with the political representatives.

**5. I move a cut of ₹100 in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the implementation of the scheme One Nation, One Ration Card in JK UT with inter-state transfer of ration cards district-wise.**

**Reply:**

ONORC enables beneficiaries to access their food entitlement under NFSA regardless of where they are in the country, breaking the restrictions of being tied to a single FPS. The facility is available on all sale centres where the PoS devices is working in online mode and Ration Card holders need not to shift their ration cards from one state to another state or one district to another district.

ONORC scheme has been in operation since July, 2020 across Jammu & Kashmir, 3.1580 lac ONORC (inter-State) and 49.042 Lakh portability (intra-State) online transactions have been made in Jammu & Kashmir ending January, 2026 as per AePDS portal. J&K is best performing in terms of the highest numbers of ONORC transactions from August, 2020 to as on date, across the Country.

**IV. Dr. Davinder Kumar Manyal, Hon'ble MLA, to move the following Cut Motions:-**

- 1. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the functioning and efficiency of the Food, Civil Supplies & Consumer Affairs Department, including ration depots, field offices, grievance redressal, and accountability of officials.**

**Reply:-**

The Food, Civil Supplies & Consumer Affairs Department is committed to ensuring transparent, efficient, and accountable delivery of essential commodities under various welfare schemes including NFSA, PMFS, SAAY and JKSSS. Functioning of Ration Depots (Fair Price Shops):

The Department operates Fair Price Shops across the Jammu & Kashmir for distribution of foodgrains under NFSA and other schemes. Distribution is being carried out through e-POS devices with Aadhaar-based authentication to ensure transparency and prevent pilferage. Regular inspections are conducted by field functionaries to monitor proper distribution and adherence to norms.

The UT of Jammu & Kashmir is among first states/UT of India which have migrated to Smart PDS completely implementing all its components

Ration Card Management system- Migration of data of about one Crore beneficiaries has been completed and UAT Go live done on August, 2025 after that around 12000 new Ration Cards and more than one lakh beneficiaries have been added to database.

SCMS- Newly Design Integrated Aadhaar Enabled Supply Chain Management and Allocation. It is fully implemented from the month of November, 2025.

Application Softwares (Mera RationApp, Anna Mitra and Anna Sahayta) - Mera Ration App, Mera eKYC App and Anna Mitra App are fully Functional and Anna Sahayat app is under Development. Beneficiaries do not need to visit FPS/Sale outlets for redressal of their grievances.

e-KYC Saturation - Extensive drives are being carried out across all the districts for early completion of e-KYC under all categories.

Upgradation of PoS Machines (L0 → L1) is under going which shall utilize latest protocol of UIDAI using Biometric encryption and iris scanner i am pleased to inform u that we also intend to introduce prototype testing of L2 devices i.e facial encryption of Aadhaar in PoS devices. We shall be the first UT in India to do the same.

Route Optimization Plan - Implemented across all the districts of J&K. Savings of more than Rs 2.00 Cr is expected annually due to implementation of route optimization plan in J&K.

Rightful Targeting (Removal of Undeserving Beneficiaries) – A special initiative of union Food and Public Distribution for rightfull

targeting of food subsidies is under going throughout india. This include useof Aadhar to cross verify false entries and ensure right targeting example GST, In come Tax, Deceased, duplicate, silent etc beneficieries. Verification of 8.87 Lakh Beneficiaries have been completed across the UT.

More than 40,000 ineligible beneficiaries identified, verified and removed from the Database. Deceased and Duplicate RCs/beneficiaries has been deleted from the Smart PDS database.

As a result of Smart PDS Implementation, a huge convince for beneficiaries is provided by using various applications like Mera Ration, Mera eKYC app which can be accessed from anywhere across the UT along with prevention of pilferage of food grains is done through various mode of authentication like Biometric, fusion, Iris, OTP. Also, facial authentication is under implementation process which will be done in the tenure of this Government.

**Functioning of Field Offices:** District and Tehsil offices are actively supervising ration depots and ensuring timely allocation and lifting of foodgrains. Complete digitization of ration cards and online services has improved service delivery and reduced manual intervention.

**Grievance Redressal Mechanism:** A structured grievance redressal system is in place at Tehsil, District, and UT levels. Complaints are received through online portals, toll-free help lines, and written representations. Time-bound disposal of

grievances is ensured, and necessary action is taken against erring dealers/officials.

**Accountability of Officials:** Regular inspections, surprise checks, and social audits are conducted. In cases of irregularities, strict action including suspension/cancellation of FPS licenses, recovery of losses, and departmental proceedings is initiated.

The Department follows zero tolerance towards corruption and negligence. The Department continues to strengthen monitoring mechanisms and adopt technology-driven reforms to enhance transparency, efficiency, and public trust.

**2. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the reasons for stoppage of providing sugar and Kerosene oil from the ration depots in Jammu Division.**

**Reply:-**

Sugar is being provided by the department under Jammu Kashmir Special Sugar Scheme (JKSSS)@1kg per AAY Household per month. As Jammu and Kashmir has been declared as kerosene Oil free state, as such there is no proposal under consideration for distribution of kerosene oil through PDS in the Department.

**3. I move a cut of 100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the non-updation of ration entitlements in cases of family bifurcation due to marriage/separation, resulting in denial of ration to eligible households, indicating the details of pending cases, reasons for delay and timeline for issuance of separate ration cards and revised entitlement.**

**Reply:**

The number of beneficiaries with ration card targets being determined and assigned by the Government of India. Beneficiary and families have been identified on the basis of

data obtained from Census 2011. Whenever revised targets are communicated by the Government of India on account of the inclusion of newly identified families, fresh ration cards under the relevant categories shall be issued accordingly.

Moreover, no beneficiary is denied/ deprived of the monthly entitlement of ration as the beneficiaries are already covered through their existing ration cards.

**4.I move a cut of 100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss whether new Fair Price Shops are proposed to be opened, indicating the location-wise details, dates of sanction, and status of proposals recommended by Hon'ble MLAs, along with reasons for non-approval, if any.**

**Reply:**

Opening of new Fair Price Shops (FPS) shall be considered only after stabilization of all components of the Smart Public Distribution System (Smart PDS) including ration card allocation system and e-KYC related modules. It has been observed that certain operational aspects of the Smart PDS are presently under stabilization.

Accordingly, the proposals for opening of new FPS may be taken up only after complete stabilization of the said system so as to ensure smooth implementation and avoid administrative or technical complication.

Subsequent to such stabilization the Department shall prepare and furnish a list of proposed new FPS strictly in consonance with the provisions of S.O 41. c. ONORC enables beneficiaries to access their food entitlement under NFSA regardless of where they are in the country, breaking the restrictions of being tied to a single FPS. The facility is available on all sale centres where the PoS devices is working in online mode.

ONORC scheme has been in operation since July, 2020 across Jammu & Kashmir, 3.1580 lac ONORC (inter-State) and 49.042 Lakh portability (intra-State) online transactions have been made in Jammu & Kashmir ending January, 2026 as per AePDS portal. J&K is best performing in terms of the highest numbers of ONORC transactions from August, 2020 to as on date, across the Country.

These commissions, such as the SCDRC in J&K UT, ensure that the consumer is protected against market exploitation. An e-platform by the name e-Jagriti has been launched in January-2025 to make consumer justice faster and more accessible across India. This new e-platform is seamlessly running across J&K UT. e-Jagriti is an initiative by the Government of India to digitize and streamline consumer dispute redressal, offering a paperless, contactless, and efficient platform for filing complaints, tracking case status, and accessing information. It connects consumer commissions at district, state, and national levels (DCDRC, SCDRC, NCDRC), promoting transparency and speedy justice.

agency for filling up of these posts. Additionally, amendments to the Non-Gazetted (Subordinate) Service Recruitment rules of FCS&CA, J&K are under process and shall be finalized shortly and the vacant posts under direct quota will be forwarded to the recruiting agency, and the promotion quota posts will be filled through DPC.

It is imperative to note that despite shortage of staff, the department ensures smooth distribution of ration and timely redressal grievance of beneficiaries.

The major component/activity(s) fully functional under SMART-PDS are Ration Card Management System, Supply Chain Management System, Distribution portal, integration of database with Mera Ration, Mera eKYC, Ayushman Bharat applications, whereas development/roll out of Procurement portal, Annamitra, Anna Sahayta App (Advanced Grievance Redressal System) is under process. Also, the activities like e-KYC

Saturation, Rightful Targeting (Removal of Undeserving Beneficiaries), Upgradation of PoS Machines (L0 → L1) are yet to be fully accomplished.

Since elected Government has assumed the office, it has been thought prudent to rope in elected representatives also to firm up requirements of new Fair Price Shops across Jammu and Kashmir, which necessitates relook of the existing framework. Further steps shall be taken after the required amendments are carried out.

**3. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the need to ensure regular functioning of ration depots at least six days a week for the convenience of beneficiaries.**

**Reply:-**

The ration depots across the Jammu & Kashmir are governed by the guidelines issued by the Administrative Department vide J&K TPDS Control Order 2023 (S.O 41 dt: 19-01-2023) under clause 31, whereunder the depots throughout the division remain active for the convenience of rationees including Sundays and Holidays considering the presence of rationees to ensure distribution of ration among all the eligible beneficiaries.

**4. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the inclusion of eligible persons with disabilities under the Antyodaya Anna Yojana ( AAY) category.**

**Reply:-**

The number of beneficiaries with ration card targets being determined and assigned by the Government of India. Beneficiary and families have been identified on the basis of data obtained from Census 2011. Whenever revised targets are communicated by the Government of India on account of the inclusion of newly identified families, fresh ration cards under the relevant categories shall be issued accordingly.

The State-wise ceiling on coverage of number of persons belonging to eligible household for receiving subsidized food grains under the TPDS in respect of AAY category already stand fixed by Government of India.

However, Department has already issued S.O 389 dated: 16.11.2021 for inclusions of all the persons with disabilities under PHH category and accordingly getting benefitted with free of cost food grains on monthly basis under NFSA.

**5. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the strengthening and increasing the number of Government ration depots in Akhnoor Town to meet public demand.**

**Reply:-**

Opening of new Fair Price Shops (FPS) shall be considered only after stabilization of all components of the Smart Public Distribution System (Smart PDS) including ration card allocation system and e-KYC related modules. It has been observed that certain operational aspects of the Smart PDS are presently under stabilization.

The major component/activity(s) fully functional under SMART-PDS are Ration Card Management System, Supply Chain Management System, Distribution portal, integration of database with Mera Ration, Mera eKYC, Ayushman Bharat applications, whereas development/roll out of Procurement portal, Annamitra, Anna Sahayta App (Advanced Grievance Redressal System) is under process. Also, the activities like e-KYC Saturation, Rightful Targeting (Removal of Undeserving Beneficiaries), Upgradation of PoS Machines (L0 → L1) are yet to be fully accomplished.

Accordingly, the proposals for opening of new FPS shall be taken up only after complete stabilization of the said system

so as to ensure smooth implementation and avoid administrative or technical complications

In the revised proposal due consideration shall also be given to Akhnoor Town as per the eligibility under the TPDS (Control orders) Rules of 2023.

**X. Mr. Vijay Kumar, Hon'ble MLA, to move the following Cut Motions.**

**1. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the effective and time-bound mechanism for providing relief to consumers on banking and other consumer-related complaints e platform for registration of complaints in J&K-UT, complaints received and disposed of during the last three years, steps taken to ensure early and effective grievance redressal, particularly in banking, insurance, Health 46 sector?**

**Reply:-**

Time bound mechanism for providing relief to consumers on banking and other consumer related complaints is envisaged under Consumer Protection Act, 2019. Consumer commissions (District, State, National) are quasi-judicial bodies established under the Consumer Protection Act, 2019 to provide, speedy, and inexpensive redressal for consumer grievances. They handle complaints regarding banking, defective goods, deficient services, and unfair trade practices, awarding compensation and enforcing consumer rights. These Consumer Courts provide effective grievance Redressal mechanism particularly in banking, insurance (Motor/Life/Health) etc.

**Key roles of consumer commissions include:**

- a. Dispute Resolution: Acting as specialized forums to resolve consumer complaints efficiently, providing an alternative to traditional, slower civil courts.
- b. Redressal and Compensation: Investigating complaints against businesses and ordering remedies, such as replacing goods, removing defects, refunding prices, or awarding compensation for injury or loss.
- c. Enforcing Consumer Rights: Protecting consumers from hazardous goods, unfair trade practices, and misleading advertisements.
- d. Three-Tier Hierarchy: Handling cases based on pecuniary (monetary) value, with District Commissions for smaller claims, State Commissions for higher values and appeals, and the National Commission (NCDRC) for high-value cases and final appeals.
- e. Ensuring Accountability: Imposing penalties on manufacturers, sellers, or service providers for unethical practices.

These commissions, such as the SCDRC in J&K UT, ensure that the consumer is protected against market exploitation.

An e-platform by the name e-Jagriti has been launched in January-2025 to make consumer justice faster and more accessible across India. This new e-platform is seamlessly running across J&K UT. e-Jagriti is an initiative by the Government of India to digitize and streamline consumer dispute redressal, offering a paperless, contactless, and efficient platform for filing complaints, tracking case status, and accessing information. It connects consumer commissions at district, state, and national levels (DCDRC, SCDRC, NCDRC), promoting transparency and speedy justice.

**XI. Mr.Kuldeep Raj Dubey, Hon'ble MLA to move the following Cut Motions:-**

- 1. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the urgent requirement for establishment of additional Fair Price Shop/Ration Depot. in Reasi-57 Assembly Constituency, where the existing distribution network is inadequate for the geographically dispersed and hilly population.**

**Reply:-**

Opening of new Fair Price Shops (FPS) shall be considered only after stabilization of all components of the Smart Public Distribution System (Smart PDS) including ration card allocation system and e-KYC related modules. It has been observed that certain operational aspects of the Smart PDS are presently under stabilization.

Accordingly, the proposals for opening of new FPS may be taken up only after complete stabilization of the said system so as to ensure smooth implementation and avoid administrative or technical complications

Subsequent to such stabilization the Department shall prepare and furnish a list of proposed new FPS strictly in consonance with the provisions of S.O 41. The said list shall also be rationalized in a comprehensive manner, keeping in view population norms, geographical factors, existing FPS coverage and administrative feasibility and in consultation with the political representatives.

The major component/activity(s) fully functional under SMART-PDS are Ration Card Management System, Supply Chain Management System, Distribution portal, integration of database with Mera Ration, Mera eKYC, Ayushman Bharat applications, whereas development/roll out of Procurement portal, Annamitra, Anna Sahayta App (Advanced Grievance Redressal System) is under process. **2. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the shortage of sanctioned staff and field functionaries in Reasi-57 Assembly Constituency, which has adversely impacted stock Management, Supervision, grievances redressal, and overall efficiency of the Public Distribution System**

**Reply:-**

All the posts borne on the establishment of FCS&CA, Department Jammu are Divisional Cadre posts. There is no separate sanctioned strength of District Reasi. The department of FCS&CA, Jammu is having shortage of staff.

Currently, following Staff is working in Reasi-57 Assembly Constituency:-

1. TSO =01

2. Storekeeper =01

3. MTS =3

All efforts are being made for recruitment against the available vacancies and in order to overcome the shortages of staff , 72 no. of posts of MTS are under inter-departmental consideration for its referral to Recruiting agency.

Further, it is submitted that amendments in non gazetted (Subordinate) Service Recruitment rules of FCS&CA-J&K are under consideration at Departmental level.

As and when the same are finalized the non gazetted vacant post of the department under direct quota shall be submitted to the Administrative Department for onward submission to JKSSB and promotion quota vacancies shall be filled through DPC.

**XII. Mr. Yudvir Sethi, Hon'ble MLA to move the following Cut Motions:-**

**1. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No.15 in order to discuss the functioning of the Food, Civil Supplies & Consumer Affairs Department.**

**Reply:-**

The Department of Food, Civil Supplies and Consumer Affairs is entrusted with the responsibility of distribution of essential commodities namely Rice, Wheat, and Sugar, under the Public Distribution System.

The Department implemented the National Food Security Act, 2013 in J&K w.e.f. February, 2016 with the objective to provide free of cost food grains to AAY, PHH beneficiaries and subsidized food grains for NPHH category under NFSA.

Additional 10 kg of Rice under SAAY Scheme to AAY Category & subsidized PMFSS rice to PHH category is also being provided to the eligible beneficiaries by the department.

Moreover, sugar @1kg perhousehold per month under JKSSS scheme is also provided at subsidized rate to AAY category in order to ensure food security for all eligible beneficiaries.

**2. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No.15 in order to discuss the delay in sanctioning of new ration cards to eligible beneficiaries and the lack of transparency in the suspension or stoppage of the existing ration cards, indicating the procedure being followed for issuance of new ration cards.**

**Reply:-**

The number of beneficiaries with ration card targets being determined and assigned by the Government of India. Beneficiary and families have been identified on the basis of data obtained from Census 2011. Whenever revised targets are communicated by the Government of India on account of the inclusion of newly identified families, fresh ration cards under the relevant categories shall be issued accordingly.

Moreover, ration cards are suspended or stopped in cases where beneficiaries have not provided their Aadhaar for all family members or where the ration cards remain silent, i.e., no ration entitlement has been availed for a long period. As and when the concerned applicant approaches the Department, the ration card is resumed after due authentication of documents and completion of procedures as per the prevailing guidelines/instructions.

As and when the concerned applicant approaches the Department, the ration card is resumed after due authentication of documents and completion of procedures as per the prevailing guidelines/instructions.

**3. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No.15 in order to discuss the need for establishment of additional Fair Price Shops/Ration Depots in the congested and narrow localities of Jammu east particularly in areas like Kanak-Mandi and Purani-Mandi, so as to reduce inconvenience and travel time for beneficiaries, especially elderly persons and women.**

**Reply:-**

Opening of new Fair Price Shops (FPS) shall be considered only after stabilization of all components of the Smart Public Distribution System (Smart PDS) including ration card allocation system and e-KYC related modules. It has been observed that certain operational aspects of the Smart PDS are presently under stabilization.

Accordingly, the proposals for opening of new FPS may be taken up only after complete stabilization of the said system so as to ensure smooth implementation and avoid administrative or technical complications

Subsequent to such stabilization the Department shall prepare and furnish a list of proposed new FPS strictly in consonance with the provisions of S.O 41. The said list shall also be rationalized in a comprehensive manner, keeping in view population norms, geographical factors, existing FPS coverage and administrative feasibility and in consultation with the political representatives.

**4. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No.15 in order to discuss the decision of the Govt to provide six free LPG Cylinders per ear only to AAY families and the need for extension of this benefit to other low income and economically weaker house holds.**

**Reply:-**

The Government has announced the provision of six free LPG cylinders per annum exclusively for Antyodaya Anna Yojana (AAY) beneficiaries.

The AAY beneficiaries are the poorest of the poor category under the public distribution system.

**XIII. Mr. Sheikh Khursheed, Hon'ble MLA to move the following Cut Motions:-**

**1. I move a cut of Rs. 100 in Demand Number 15 in order to discuss the need to ensure inclusion of all eligible households under the National Food Security Act (NFSA) and allied food security schemes in Langate constituency, indicating the category wise (AAY/PHH total number of ration cards cancelled, suspended or kept inactive in Langate constituency alongwith the reasons for such cancellations or exclusions. Reply:-**

The Department of FCS&CA in adherence to the guidelines ensures inclusion of families/ beneficiaries under PDS as per the eligibility criteria mentioned in S.O 389 Dated: 16-11-2021. The addition/deletion/modification of ration cards is an ongoing process, and applications are being received and processed regularly through the online system as well as through offline mode as per the prescribed procedure and timelines.

Moreover, the Government vide Order No. 2129-JK (GAD) of 2024 Dated:- 24-12-2024 has constituted a committee for ensuring eligibility of existing beneficiaries in the PDS data base under relevant categories as per the applicable norms and weeding out of ineligible beneficiaries and ensuring inclusion of left out beneficiaries if any in appropriate categories.

With regard to the Langate constituency, as per records on the Smart PDS portal, no ration card in Langate constituency has been cancelled, suspended, or kept inactive. Further, no application or representation has been received so far regarding wrongful cancellation, suspension, or exclusion of ration cards. Hence, no appeals are pending or disposed of in this regard, nor has any responsibility been fixed against any official.

**2. I move a cut of Rs. 100 in Demand Number 15 in order to discuss the reasons of repeated biometric authentication failures at Fair Price Shops (FPSs) in Langate constituency, leading to denial of food grains to eligible beneficiaries, indicating the: (a) the FPS-wise data of biometric transaction failures in Langate; (b) The number of beneficiaries denied ration due to authentication failure; (c) Whether offline/manual or alternative authentication mechanisms were authorised and compensatory or deferred distribution mechanism exists for affected households.**

**Reply:-**

No case of denial of ration due to biometric transaction failure has been reported from Langate constituency. In case of any biometric authentication reported, ration is issued through OTP-based authentication as per guidelines. For elderly beneficiaries or those facing persistent biometric issues, nominee addition is facilitated to ensure uninterrupted supply of foodgrains. It is clarified that nominee provision is allowed only when the ration card contains two or more beneficiaries, and in no case more than the prescribed number of nominees is permitted.

**3. I move a cut of Rs. 100 in Demand Number 15 in order to discuss the adequate Fair Price Shops in far-flung and hilly villages of Langate constituency, including Reshwari, Pothwari, Nowgam, Monabal, Lunda, Lahikoot, Shiltera, Mankal, Mudwa, ChakSanzipora, Bumdogar, Magam, Magam Dansatan, DaiiNelipora, Magam Bunpora, Pohrupeth, Chogul-Bunpora, and villages of Qaziabad and Nutnusa, forcing beneficiaries to travel long distances for ration, as also the need for opening of new FPSs in these areas.**

**Reply:-**

The proposal for opening of new FPSs or alternative arrangements in far-flung and hilly areas is processed on the recommendations of the concerned Worthy Hon'ble MLA/Chairman as per norms. However, the villagewise list of proposed FPS locations for Langate constituency has not yet been finalised, and as such no further action could be initiated at this stage. The Administrative Department FCS&CA J&K vide J&K TPDS Control Order 2023 (S.O 41 dt: 19-01-2023) has notified the criteria for identification of uncovered areas for establishment of new fair price shops across the Kashmir division. The criteria specified is as follows: 1) New Fair Price Shops shall be opened in

each Panchayat/Municipal Ward/ULB as far as possible. The area of operation of such Fair Price Shop shall be the Panchayat/Municipal Ward/ULB as the case may be. (2) The number of Fair Price Shops to be opened shall be based on the population of the Panchayat/ Municipal Ward/ULB. (3) The location of the Fair Price Shop shall be decided by the Committee constituted for the purpose. (4) The licensing authority shall consider the opening of new FPS within a radius of 1.5 to 2 Km, as far as possible, to cater the need of the rationees in an area, satisfying the general norms under the order. However, the rationees across the Kashmir division including far flung/ hilly areas are already covered through the existing sale depots scattered for the convenience of rationees.

**4. I move a cut of Rs. 100 in Demand Number 15 in order to discuss the need to ensure regular, timely and full distribution of ration in Langate constituency, particularly in Reshwari, Pothwari, Nowgam, Monabal, Lunda, Lahikoot, Shiltera, Mankal, Mudwa, Pohrupeth, MagamBunpora and adjoining villages, indicating the details of : (a) Month-wise allocation, lifting and actual distribution figures for Langate constituency (b) FPSwise details of delayed, irregular or short distribution; (c) The reasons for non-lifting or partial lifting of food grains; (d) Action taken against FPS dealers or agencies responsible for delay or diversion; and (e) The corrective measures proposed to ensure uninterrupted and full distribution in future.**

**Reply:-**

The Month-wise details of allocation of foodgrains for Langate constituency is as under:

The above quantities are regularly allocated as per norms. With regard to the delayed or irregular distribution there is no delayed or irregular distribution of foodgrains in Langate constituency. Distribution is carried out smoothly and within the prescribed timelines. Besides, to ensure uninterrupted supply and to avoid any inconvenience to beneficiaries, advance lifting of foodgrains is carried out for the subsequent month wherever required.

**5. I move a cut of Rs. 100 in Demand Number 15 in order to discuss the need to implement effective, village-specific food security and consumer welfare measures inLangate constituency, indicating: (a) Scheme-wise and village-wise details of NFSA, AAY, PMGKAY and other UTspecific schemes; (b) Funds allocated, released and utilized, scheme-wise and village-wise; (c) Special provisions for villages without FPSs, including advance stocking and buffer arrangements; (d) The status of inspections, enforcement and grievance redressal mechanisms; and (e) clear, time-bound future roadmap to ensure universal food security in the constituency.**

**Reply**

To ensure improved village specific food security and consumer welfare, the Department has established FPS wise/ village wise

vigilance committees (comprising of all stakeholders including local educated person) operational for monitoring and reporting over the functionalities of the department under various schemes. The village/ FPS wise details of beneficiaries/ rationees registered under AAY, PHH and NPHH categories is enclosed at **Annexure "C"**. The beneficiaries under these schemes are entitled under the different schemes i.e. NFSA/ NPHH, PMFSS and SAAY. Besides, there is no village without a Fair Price Shop (FPS). However, if any requirement arises, the Hon'ble MLA is required to submit the proposed FPS location for further necessary action.

With regard to the grievances, all grievances received are disposed of as per departmental norms, and the complainants are satisfied with the redressal provided.

Moreover, a clear, time-bound roadmap is in place to ensure food security in the constituency, which includes advance timely allocation and lifting of foodgrains, strengthening of FPS infrastructure, prompt grievance redressal, facilitation of alternative authentication mechanisms, and periodic monitoring and review to ensure coverage of all eligible beneficiaries.

#### **XIV. Dr. Bharat Bhushan, Hon'ble MLA to move the following Cut Motions:-**

- 1. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the working of FCS & CA Department with special reference to the number of AAY, BPL and APL families of Kathua District and Kathua Constituency separately with details of AAY families of Kathua town, Kathua Block, Nagri Block and Keerian Block.**

#### **Reply:**

The Department Food, Civil Supplies and Consumer Affairs is ensuring the Food Security of every eligible individual across the J&K. To fulfill the purpose the Department is primarily operating over the schemes like PradhanMantriGaribKalyan Anna Yojana

(PMGKAY) in terms of National Food Security Act (NFSA), Prime Minister's Food Supplementation Scheme (PMFSS), Jammu and Kashmir Special Sugar Scheme (JKSSS) and Scheme for Antodaya Anna Yojana (SAAY) whereunder the Foodgrains (Fortified Rice, Wheat/ Atta and Sugar) under respective categories i.e. AAY, PHH and NPHH are being provided to the eligible beneficiaries in a transparent matter through a network of Govt. Sale Centres and Fair Price Shops scattered in every nook and corner of the J&K monitored via AEPDS module on real time basis.

The Department implemented the National Food Security Act, 2013 in whole of the J&K State with effect from February, 2016 with the objective to provide free/subsidized food grains under NFSA/Non-NFSA in order to ensure food security for all eligible beneficiaries under the Public Distribution System in the UT of J&K.

So far as number of AAY, BPL and APL families of Kathua District and Kathua Constituency is concerned , the categories wise beneficiaries under AAY,PHH and NPHH under NFSA are as under:-

Also, the activities like e-KYC Saturation, Rightful Targeting (Removal of Undeserving Beneficiaries), Upgradation of PoS Machines (L0 → L1) are yet to be fully accomplished.

Since elected Government has assumed the office, it has been thought prudent to rope in elected representatives also to firm up requirements of new Fair Price Shops across Jammu and Kashmir, which necessitates relook of the existing framework. Further steps shall be taken after the required amendments are carried out.

**XV. Mr. Darshan Kumar, Hon'ble MLA to move the following Cut Motions: .**

- 1. I move a cut of Rs. 100/- in Demand No.15 in order to discuss the functioning of the Food, Civil Supplies & Consumer Affairs Department in Basohli Constituency, particularly with regard to distribution of ration under the Public Distribution System (PDS).**

**Reply:-**

Distribution of ration under the Public Distribution System (PDS) is a crucial mechanism for ensuring food security and distribution of foodgrains at free of cost to AAY and PHH families and at subsidised rates to NPHH families and same mechanism is being adopted in Basohli Constituency, particularly regarding distribution of ration under the Public Distribution System (PDS)

In addition to above, additional foodgrains are provided to eligible AAY and PHH beneficiaries with family size ranging from 1 to 6 under the schemes launched by the J&K Government namely Scheme for Antyodaya Anna Yojana (SAAY) and Pradhan Mantri Food Supplementation Scheme (PMFSS) respectively. Besides, 1 Kg Sugar per month is provided to each AAY family.

Distribution is done through ePoS devices from Fair Price Shops (FPS) and Government Sale Centres run by the Food, Civil Supplies & Consumer Affairs (FCS&CA) Department.

**2. I move a cut of Rs. 100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss inclusion and exclusion errors in ration cards, pendency of such cases, the quality of food grains being supplied under PDS and the functioning of the ration depots/Fair Price Shops in remote and hilly areas.**

**Reply:-**

The Department, vide S.O. 389 of 2021 dated: 17.11.2021 has notified the inclusion and exclusion criteria for the Union Territory, which are being followed in letter and spirit.

With regard to pending cases, applications are being processed in a time-bound manner. However, the process involves detailed scrutiny, field verification, and e-KYC compliance, which may result in pendency in some cases.

Nevertheless, it is ensured that applications are disposed of within the prescribed timelines.

An appeal and grievance redressal mechanism is available for applicants who feel aggrieved, and such cases are reviewed in accordance with the notified criteria to ensure that no eligible beneficiary is excluded.

Besides, the Department of FCS&CA ensures quality Foodgrains are procured from Food Corporation of India and duly supplied to the sale depots across the J&K. The quality checks conducted by FCI in coordination with the Departmental officers/ officials posted at respective FCI Godowns/ PEGs and random sampling by the Food Safety Officials across the division through testing labs ensure that only good quality Foodgrains are supplied to the bonafide beneficiaries.

The ration depots established in the remote and hilly areas remain operational throughout the year, however, in case of network issues, on the request of concerned district officer, the e-pos devices are converted to offline mode for smooth distribution.

**3. I move a cut of Rs. 100/- in Demand No.15 in order to discuss the steps taken to check black marketing and diversion of food grains, and the status of digitization and Aadhaar seeding of ration cards.**

**Reply:-**

With regard to digitization and Aadhaar seeding of ration cards, the beneficiary database available with the Department has been fully digitized. The Department has achieved 100% Aadhaar seeding at both the ration card and beneficiary levels and is now

integrated with the SMART PDS platform, enabling real-time monitoring of transactions.

All transactions are conducted through e-PoS devices with biometric authentication, which has significantly reduced the scope for diversion and black marketing. Regular inspections and stock verification are carried out to ensure transparency and accountability.

**4. I move a cut of Rs. 100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the measures taken to provide doorstep services to beneficiaries, as people are compelled to visit the TSO office repeatedly even for minor issues, causing inconvenience, particularly to elderly and rural residents.**

**Reply:-**

To facilitate doorstep delivery of services and to minimize the need for beneficiaries to visit government offices—particularly elderly persons and residents of rural/remote areas—the Department has recently introduced a new online portal, [jk.smartpds.nic.in](http://jk.smartpds.nic.in)

Through this portal, beneficiaries can avail the following services online without physically visiting any government office:

- Download ration card
- Modify ration card
- Transfer of ration card
- Addition of family members
- Deletion of family members
- Change of Head of Family (HoF)

**5. I move a cut of Rs. 100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the cases where ration of BPL beneficiaries has been stopped due to duplication of names or similar parentage details, and the corrective mechanism to ensure that genuine beneficiaries are not deprived of their entitlements.**

**Reply:-**

The Department is committed to providing food grains to all covered bonafide rationees and ensures that no beneficiary is deprived of ration. Instances of duplication, silent ration cards, and other discrepancies identified through system-based verification are rectified in a timely manner.

Wherever genuine beneficiaries are affected due to system-based flagging, corrective action is taken after due verification to restore their entitlement without undue delay.

**XVI. Mr. Waheed Ur Rehman Parra, Hon'ble MLA to move the following Cut Motions: -**

**1. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the number of Antyodaya Anna Yojana (AAY) ration cards converted or downgraded to BPL category with district-wise and constituency-wise details; the number of ration cards deleted during the last two years along with reasons therefor, the number of new ration cards issued in the same period category-wise-APL, BPL and AAY-with district and constituency-wise break-up; whether any verification or re-survey was conducted prior to such deletions or conversions; and the safeguards in place to ensure that eligible beneficiaries are not excluded from food security coverage.**

**Reply:-**

The number and the constituency wise details of AAY Ration Cards converted to PHH category is enclosed at **Annexure "D"**.No of ration cards issued during last two years is enclosed at **Annexure-E**.

**2. 1 move a cut of Rs. 100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the need for establishment and functioning of Fair Price Shops (FPS) across the Union Territory, with district-wise details; the number of new FPS opened during the last two years and the criteria adopted for their sanction, particularly in underserved and far- flung areas;**

**Reply:-**

Opening of new Fair Price Shops (FPS) shall be considered only after stabilization of all components of the Smart Public Distribution System (Smart PDS) including ration card allocation system and e-KYC related modules. It has been observed that certain operational aspects of the Smart PDS are presently under stabilization.

Accordingly, the proposals for opening of new FPS may be taken up only after complete stabilization of the said system so as to ensure smooth implementation and avoid administrative or technical complications.

Subsequent to such stabilization the Department shall prepare and furnish a list of proposed new FPS strictly in consonance with the provisions of S.O 41. The said list shall also be rationalized in a comprehensive manner, keeping in view population norms, geographical factors, existing FPS coverage and administrative feasibility and in consultation with the political representatives.

The major component/activity(s) fully functional under SMART-PDS are Ration Card Management System, Supply Chain Management System, Distribution portal, integration of database with Mera Ration, MeraeKYC, Ayushman Bharat applications, whereas development/roll out of Procurement portal, Annamitra, Anna Sahayta App (Advanced Grievance Redressal System) is under process. Also, the activities like e-KYC Saturation, Rightful Targeting (Removal of Undeserving Beneficiaries), Upgradation of PoS Machines (L0 → L1) are yet to be fully accomplished.

Since elected Government has assumed the office, it has been thought prudent to rope in elected representatives also to firm up requirements of new Fair Price Shops across Jammu and Kashmir, which necessitates relook of the existing framework. Further steps shall be taken after the required amendments are carried out.

**3. I move a cut of Rs. 100/- In Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the persistent deficiencies in the Public Distribution System (PDS), Including exclusion of BPL households, delays in stock supply, Aadhaar/e-POS authentication failures, and weak grievance redressal, Indicating the number of Fair Price Shops district-wise, disparities in commission between rural and urban areas, and the corrective measures proposed to ensure timely and transparent ration distribution across J&K.**

**Reply:**

The Public Distribution System in the Union Territory of Jammu & Kashmir is functioning smoothly and efficiently, with robust mechanisms in place to ensure transparency, accountability, and timely distribution of foodgrains to all eligible beneficiaries.

There is no exclusion of eligible PHH(BPL) households, as beneficiary data is periodically verified and updated in accordance with the prescribed guidelines. Adequate stocks are maintained at all levels, and there are no delays in supply or distribution. Aadhaar/e-POS based authentication systems are functioning effectively, with necessary fall back provisions available to address rare technical issues, thereby ensuring that no genuine beneficiary is denied rations.

A well-established grievance redressal mechanism is operational at the district and UT levels to promptly address any complaints. Regular monitoring and inspections are carried out to maintain efficiency and transparency in the system.

The district-wise number of Fair Price Shops is well maintained as per approved norms to ensure accessibility and convenience for beneficiaries. The commission structure for Fair Price Shop dealers has been rationalized appropriately. Overall, the Department continues to take proactive measures to further strengthen the PDS framework and ensure seamless, transparent, and timely distribution of foodgrains across Jammu & Kashmir.

**4. I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the glitches in AePDS and ration card verification/renewal, lack of transparency in stock allocation, irregular supply and weighing discrepancies at Fair Price Shops, and weak enforcement against overpricing and hoarding, indicating the steps being taken to restore the system and ensure effective monitoring, inspections and grievance redressal.**

**Reply**

The Department is functioning smoothly and has enhanced transparency and accountability in the distribution process. Ration card verification are conducted in a systematic and time-bound

manner through an online platform. Stock allocation and supply are properly regulated and monitored through digital systems, ensuring timely and accurate distribution at Fair Price Shops.

Effective monitoring, regular inspections, and a robust grievance redressal mechanism are in place. Overall, the system is operating efficiently, and the Department remains committed to ensuring transparent and seamless delivery of foodgrains to all eligible beneficiaries.

**5. I move a cut of Rs. 100/-in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss status of casual labourers, need-based workers and other temporary staff engaged in the Food, Civil Supplies & Consumer Affairs Department across Jammu and Kashmir; the total number engaged district-wise, their nature of duties in godowns, Fair Price Shop monitoring and field operations; and the Government's time-bound policy for regularisation or service protection of such workers.**

**Reply:-**

The Department has engaged casual labourers under Minimum Wages Guarantee Act for loading and unloading of the foodgrains from JKRTC vehicles / trucks in Food Stores / Godowns.

The services of Night Chowkidars are used for watch and ward of Food Stores and in exigencies, sometimes their services are utilized in Food Stores and Sale Depots. Further, the services of Consolidated workers are used in offices and in exigencies, sometimes their services are utilized in Food Stores and Sale Depots, besides, the consolidated drivers are driving departmental vehicles.

However, there is no other duties assigned to them in Fair Price Shops monitoring and other field operations.

**xvii. Aga Syed Muntazir Mehdi, Hon'ble MLA to move the following Cut Motions:**

- 1. I move a cut of Rs. 100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss whether subsidized kerosene is being provided to AAY and PHH beneficiaries in pursuance to Order No 36424/FCS&CA/Legal/66/2021 and , if not the reason for non-implementation of said order.**

**Reply:-**

Kerosene Oil in Jammu & Kashmir was being distributed amongst bonafide beneficiaries of AAY & PHH Categories as per SRO - 285 of 2016 and other Government Orders issued on the subject from time to time. However, the demand of Commodity got decreased at large due to which no allocation has been made beyond October-2022 by the Government. Relevant to mention, that no demand has been received from the common consumers for the said Commodity so far by the Department as reported

owing to 100 % LPG penetration. Moreover, Jammu and Kashmir has been declared as kerosene Oil free state, as such there is no proposal under consideration for distribution of kerosene oil through PDS in the Department.

**2. I move a cut of Rs. 100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the need for opening an online portal for conversion of APL ration card into BPL or AAY categories.**

**Reply:-**

Registration and conversion of ration cards are ongoing process, and applications are being received and processed regularly through the online as well as offline mode as per the prescribed procedure. However, during migration from the RCMS platform to the SMART PDS system, the Ration Card Management Module remained non-functional w.e.f. 26 May 2025 until 18 August 2025, after which it was made operational again. The perceived stagnation in some areas is largely attributable to the necessary verification of legacy data, duplication checks, Aadhaar seeding and e-KYC compliance requirements, as well as scrutiny to prevent the inclusion of ineligible or duplicate beneficiaries. The Department remains committed to ensuring that no eligible household is left uncovered and that ration card issuance continues in a transparent, time-bound and technology-driven manner.

**3. I move a cut of Rs. 100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss whether the Government proposes to withdraw prohibition on SPLIT ration cards so that newly formed families can obtain separate ration cards.**

**Reply:**

The number of beneficiaries with ration card targets being determined and assigned by the Government of India. Beneficiary and families have been identified on the basis of data obtained from Census 2011. Whenever revised targets are communicated by the Government of India on account of the inclusion of newly identified families, fresh ration cards under the relevant categories shall be issued accordingly.

**4. I move a cut of Rs. 100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the need for establishment of a food testing laboratory in Budgam to check Adulteration and ensure quality of food items.**

**Reply:**

Establishment of testing laboratories are mandate of Health & Medical Education Department and as per the inputs received from the said department as on date there is no dedicated Food Testing Laboratory in District Budgam. However, one Mobile Food Testing Van (MFTV) has been placed in district Budgam to carry out on Spot Food Testing, awareness and training to the Food Business Operators as well as general public.

The department has 02 Food Testing Laboratories one each in Jammu and Kashmir Division. Both the labs are NABL-FSSAI Notified and well equipped. The Food Testing Lab Srinagar is authorized to test 354 parameters. The department also has 12 Mobile Food Testing Vans (MFTVs) which are deployed from time to time in different districts to disseminate awareness, training and hold inspections and testing including Budgam.

Further, proposal for two State of Art Food Testing Laboratories and 10 MFTVs is under consideration of FSSAI for strengthening and implementation of Food Safety and Standards Act, in J&K including Budgam. With addition of 10

more Mobile Food Testing Vans (MFTVs), the Department will be able to cover each district with one MFTV.

**5.I move a cut of Rs. 100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the division-wise details of AAY ration card holders removed during FY 2024-25 and shifted to other categories, separately for Jammu & Kashmir Division.**

**Reply:**

The division-wise details of AAY ration card holders removed during FY 2024-25 and shifted to other categories separately are as under:

Jammu Division = 1319

Kashmir division= 401

**XVIII. Mr. Shabir Ahmad Kullay, Hon'ble MLA to move the following Cut Motions:**

are communicated by the Government of India on account of the inclusion of newly identified families, fresh ration cards under the relevant categories shall be issued accordingly.

**2.I move a cut of Rs. 100 in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the desirability for opening of additional number of Fair Price Shops in Shopian Constituency, particularly in far-flung and tribal areas, so as to ensure better accessibility, timely distribution of essential commodities, and effective implementation of the Public Distribution System indicating the constituency-wise details of Fair Price Shops in District Shopian.**

**Reply:-**

There is a proposal of 22 new Fair Price Shops in Shopian Constituency enclosed at **annexure "G"**.

The constituency wise Fair Price shops alongwith location and attached ration cards is enclosed at **Annexure "H"**.

**XIX.Thakur Randhir Singh, Hon'ble MLA to move the following cut motions:-**

**1.I move a cut of Rs.100/- in Demand No. 15 in order to discuss the district-wise and constituency-wise details of allocation, lifting and distribution of foodgrains and other essential commodities, number of beneficiaries covered, subsidy provided, complaintsreceived and disposed of,**

**inspections conducted during the last three years with special reference to Kalakote–Sunderbani vis-à-vis other constituencies.**

**Reply:-**

NFSA Act has been rolled out in J&K from February, 2016 onwards under which food grains are being provided to the bonafide beneficiaries under different categories i.e., @35Kg/month for AAY families & 5Kg/month for PHH & NPHH beneficiaries through a network of Govt. Sale Depots and Fair Price Shops.

The NFSA allocation is conveyed (District-wise) on the basis of number of beneficiaries enrolled on the data base of the departmental portal i.e, AePDS portal which is open in public domain.

The district-wise details of distribution against allocation of food grains is also accessible in the said portal. The department is distributing due quota of ration based on the approved scale/ rate fixed by the Govt.

Regular inspections are conducted throughout the year by the officer/officials of the department to ensure effective implementation of PDS and enforcement of departmental guidelines. These inspections include FPS inspection to verify proper distribution of food grains, maintenance of stock registers, display of mandatory information, adherence to prescribed scale of issue in letter & spirit.

Further, The district-wise details of allocation, lifting and distribution of food grains , number of beneficiaries covered &

complaints received and disposed of during the last three years is enclosed as **Annexure-I** for reference.

However, with special reference to Kalakote–Sunderbani constituencies, the detail is enclosed as **Annexure-J** for reference
